Will I find the front discs are "Hard" or "Floppy" and are they 2 gigabyte or just 144 megabyte? Are they marked and if so where? Can I change the fronts to 5 gigabyte and refit the floppy's on the rear to improve the performance?

Dear "Troubled" (Very Troubled!)

It is not advisable to fit "Floppies" to the front end. They contain so much information that the slightest application of the brake pedal is likely to cause the rear wheels to suddenly lift smartly upwards and both driver and passenger will find themselves in a tangled heap in the back of the car in front. Hard discs are preferable but since the "TF-1700" has no onboard computer they can become frustrated... and this can result in effects far worse than that outlined above. **Do not** fit discs of any format to the rear end......the hand brake won't work!

The exact reverse is true for a modern Mercedes or BMW, where just about everything is now coupled to a computer......perhaps you are confused?
